Miss Phillips will commence in post in July pending job plan review. We wish her all the best of luck in her new role.



<u>Pinderfields Theatres electrical</u> <u>works enter phase two</u>



The second phase of the Pinderfields Theatres electrical works will start on 8 July and run to 15 July in Theatres 10, 11, 12, 12a, and 14.

These works will be carried out overnight, starting at 9pm and finishing at 4am each day.

During this time, there are several changes including:

- 1. The flow of patients to theatre
- 2. Access to the blood fridge
- 3. Access to the gas analyser.

Community Dental Service champions national 'Selfie Your Smile' campaign



The Community Dental Service (CDS) has been supporting the 'Selfie Your Smile' campaign, an initiative launched by Dental Trauma UK in partnership with the British Society of Paediatric Dentistry (BSPD).

The campaign encourages families to take clear photographs of their children's smiles, and their own, as a precautionary measure. These photos can serve as valuable references in the unfortunate event of dental trauma, such as a broken or knocked-out tooth.

Rachael Nichol, Consultant in Paediatric Dentistry with the Community Dental Service (pictured), said: "We are forever zooming in on parents' photos of their children, trying to get a clear view of what their teeth looked like before an accident. These images help us reposition and repair damaged teeth as accurately as possible, aiming to restore a child's smile to how it used to be."

Dental injuries, especially in children, are



more common than many realise, often resulting from sports, falls, or everyday accidents. Having a photo of the original smile can improve outcomes during emergency dental treatment.

The CDS hopes the campaign will raise awareness and encourage families to take a proactive step in protecting their dental health. A simple selfie today could make a world of difference tomorrow!





Sky News interviews Miss Downey



Urology Consultant Miss Alison Downey was interviewed by national Sky News this week, for an in-depth news story about ketamine use and how it can affect the bladder.

Alison was interviewed on Gate 3A by North of England correspondent Shingi Mararike, who talked to her about a common side affect of Ketamine, which is that it can quickly cause your bladder to shrink to a fifth of its normal size.

This causes problems with internal organs as well as the social impact of having to urinate as frequently as up to once every half an hour.

SAU team praised for 'excellent' patient care




A day case patient has written to the Trust to say thank you for the 'first class' care they received recently from SAU, Gate 40, at Pinderfields.

Starting the week of 7 July 2025, we will be introducing a new referral process for patients requiring discussion at the Cancer Unknown Primary (CUP) MDT.

Referrals should now be submitted electronically via the ICE system. Simply search for "CUP MDT" within the patient's ICE record on the requesting page to submit your referral.

This new process replaces the previous paper-based referral form, offering a more efficient and reliable way to refer patients going forward.
